PSC AGM 2026

Motion 1: Free Marwan Campaign

Proposer: Jewish Voice for Liberation

Secunder: Naomi Wimborne Idrissi

This AGM notes

- i) the many thousands of Palestinians imprisoned by Israel after deeply flawed trials or no trial at all
- ii) the incarceration of Marwan Barghouti since 2002 after a trial condemned by the International Parliamentary Union for its numerous breaches of procedure and fabricated evidence
- iii) his repeated torture while imprisoned
- iv) his status as the leader with the potential to unite Palestinians in their struggle

and calls for the PSC Executive Committee to

- prioritise campaigning for his release and build the campaign for the release of all Palestinian prisoners unjustly incarcerated
- publicise the cruel conditions in which Barghouti and all Palestinian prisoners are held and the normalisation of torture in Israel's gaols
- work cooperatively with relevant organisations including the Free Marwan campaign to increase political and public support for his release.

Motion 1 Amendment

Proposer: PSC Executive Committee

1. In title insert between "Free Marwan" and "Campaign", "and Palestinian Political Prisoners"
2. In point ii. insert between "incarceration" and "of", "or assassination by Israel of potential leaders of the Palestinian movement, most visibly" and add after "Barghouti", "imprisoned".
3. In point ii. insert "or assassination by Israel of potential leaders of the Palestinian movement, most visibly the incarceration of" between incarceration and Marwan.
4. Add as point iii. "the copious evidence showing that Israel's military courts systematically deny Palestinians the fundamental right to a fair trial, and have embedded in them grave violations of international law amounting to war crimes."
5. Make point iii point iv and replace "his repeated" with "Israel's systematic" and replace "while imprisoned" with "Palestinian prisoners"
6. Delete point iv and replace with the above.
7. In bullet one replace "prioritise campaigning for his release and build" with "prioritise calling for Marwan Barghouti's release as part of"

8. In bullet two delete “Barghouti and all” and insert between “prisoners” and “are”, “especially of leaders of the movement such as Barghouti.”
9. In bullet three delete all after “work cooperatively with” and replace with “the Free Marwan campaign and other organisations supporting the rights of Palestinian political prisoners.”

Motion 3: Palestinian Statehood Now!

Proposer: Twm Draper

Seconder: Mary Addosides

This AGM notes:

- On the 21st of September 2025, the United Kingdom formally recognised the State of Palestine, marking a shift in British Foreign policy.
- That France, another colonial power in the region, also recognised the State of Palestine on the same day.
- That the UK joins over 150 countries worldwide in recognising Palestine, making it the fourth permanent member of the UN Security Council to do so, alongside China, Russia, and France – leaving the United States as the sole holdout.
- That recognition affirms Palestinian Statehood under international law, challenges narratives denying its existence, and reinforces the illegality of Israel’s ongoing military occupation and annexation of Palestinian land.

This AGM believes:

- That recognition must be more than symbolic—it must be linked to concrete legal and diplomatic actions to end Israel’s illegal occupation and genocide.
- That once recognised, Palestine must be treated as a sovereign equal in all diplomatic, legal, and political dealings.
- That Israeli military actions in Palestine should be recognised as acts of aggression against a sovereign state, not internal security measures.
- That recognition strengthens the legal claim to Palestinian territory based on pre-June 1967 borders, including East Jerusalem as the capital, and supports the July 2024 International Court of Justice advisory opinion declaring the occupation and annexation unlawful.
- That recognition entails legal obligations under international law, including:
 - Non-assistance to the occupation (e.g., banning goods from illegal settlements, halting arms and surveillance exports used in occupied territories).
 - Diplomatic differentiation between Israel and Palestine in official dealings.

- Active cooperation to end the occupation under Article 41 of the ILC Draft Articles on State Responsibility.

This meeting resolves to:

1. Welcome the UK's recognition of the State of Palestine and the upgrading of the Palestinian Mission in London to full embassy status.
2. Call on the UK government to implement its recognition through:
 - Enforcing trade bans on goods and services linked to illegal settlements.
 - End arms exports and military cooperation with Israel.
 - Supporting Palestine's participation in international forums and legal proceedings, including at the International Criminal Court.
 - Differentiating clearly between Israeli and Palestinian territory in policy, commerce, and diplomacy.
3. Campaign publicly on the benefits of recognition for the Palestinian people, highlighting it as a vital step toward justice, self-determination, and peace.
4. Urge coordination with other states—particularly France, Spain, and Canada—to build a “critical mass” of international pressure on Israel to end the occupation.
5. Reaffirm our solidarity with the Palestinian people and commit to supporting their rights under international law.

Motion 3 Amendment

Proposer: PSC Executive Committee

This AGM notes:

Amend point 4:

- Replace “affirms” with “reaffirms”

Add point 5:

- The British government has however made its recognition conditional, imposing requirements on who governs the Palestinian people.

Add point 6:

- That since the announcement of the recognition of the state of Palestine by various Western governments, many of those same governments have joined Donald Trump's so-called “Board of Peace”.

This AGM believes:

Amend point 2:

- Delete “once recognised”

Amend point 4:

- Replace “strengthens” with “reaffirms”.
- Replace from “the legal claim” to “the capital” with “the legal claim that Palestinians have to their land”

Delete point 7.

Add point 9:

- The right of self determination includes the right of a sovereign people to determine the shape of the state that will be the vehicle of exercising self determination, and who will form the government of that state. It is not for external bodies to impose conditions.

Add point 10:

- That Donald Trump’s so-called “Board of Peace” is a disgraceful plan to entrench colonial rule over Gaza. The Palestinian people alone have the right to determine Gaza’s future.

This meeting resolves to:

Amend point 1:

- Replace “welcome” with “note”

Amend point 2:

- Replace “implement its recognition through” with “make its recognition of the Palestinian state more than symbolic through”
- Delete from “Differentiating” to “diplomacy”
- Add at end: “Publicly opposing Donald Trump’s plans for a so-called “Board of Peace” to rule Gaza and rejecting any invitation for the UK to join the body.”

Motion 4: Escalating Campaigns To Defend The Right To Protest And Freedom Of Expression

Proposer: Toya Snelson

Secunder: Anne Alexander

This AGM notes:

- The ongoing criminalisation of peaceful protest, particularly within the context of Palestinian solidarity, through the use of counter-terrorism laws and the Terrorism Act.
- Over 2700 arrests on Terrorism charges of people participating in pro-Palestine demonstrations since July this year as a result of repression directed at the Lift the Ban campaign coordinated by Defend our Juries
- The abusive treatment of the Filton24 prisoners leading to protracted hunger strikes by eight detainees at grave risk to their lives and health.

This AGM believes:

- The right to protest is fundamental to democratic society, and attempts to criminalise dissent, particularly through the misuse of counter-terrorism laws, represent an assault on civil liberties and human rights.
- The Palestine Solidarity Campaign (PSC) must continue to support activists facing state repression for their role in Palestine solidarity activism, particularly those involved in non-violent direct actions that challenge Israeli apartheid and genocide.

Building a strong, united movement for Palestine requires collective solidarity across various forms of resistance, recognising that defending the right to protest and resisting repression is essential to winning justice for

Palestine. This AGM resolves:

To work in coordination with DoJ, Prisoners for Palestine, the trade unions and the Palestine Coalition to organise a national campaign in defence of the right to protest including a national speaking tour and days of action in universities and workplaces

Motion 4 Amendment

Proposer: PSC Executive Committee

This AGM notes:

Amend point 1:

- Replace “and the terrorism act” with “and public order legislation”

Amend point 2:

- After “demonstrations” add: “organised by Defend Our Juries following the proscription of Palestine Action”
- Delete everything after “July” and replace with “2025, the targeting of artists and musicians, health workers and academics, attempts to criminalise certain chants and slogans, and the unprecedented use of police powers since 2023 to restrict marches and other protests including the prosecution of protest organisers and participants.”

Amend point 3:

- Replace “Filton 24 prisoners” with “imprisoned activists associated with Palestine Action”

Add point 4:

- Current attempts to further restrict the right to protest including through the Crime and Policing bill.

This AGM believes:

Amend point 1:

- Delete: “particularly through the misuse of counter-terrorism laws”

Amend point 2:

- Delete: “particularly those involved in non-violent direct actions that challenge Israeli apartheid and genocide.”

Amend point 3:

- Between “resistance,” and “recognising”, insert: “understanding that each of these attacks is an attack on the movement as a whole, rejecting the state’s attempts to pit one tactic or section of the movement against another, and”

This AGM resolves:

- Delete and replace with: “To resist this repression by continuing our campaigning for Palestinian rights and continue to work in coordination with the widest possible range of solidarity organisations, activist groups, civil liberties campaigns, trade unions, faith groups, climate justice organisations, parliamentarians and others in defence of the right to protest including through in-person and online public meetings, demonstrations and other campaigning activities.”

Motion 5: Local Authorities Against Genocide and Apartheid

Proposer: Cardiff PSC

Seconder: Clive Haswell

The AGM notes:

1. the increase in popular support against Israel's genocide is influencing the views of local councillors
2. there has been a resultant adoption of divestment policies by many local authorities
3. the momentum around divestment in LG Pension Schemes provides a basis for a broader based initiative organised by local councillors to extend solidarity activity around a BDS agenda.

The AGM resolves:

1. to ask the incoming EC to collaborate with sympathetic members of local authorities to establish a "Local Authorities Against Genocide and Apartheid (LAAGA)", similar to the LA Against Apartheid group in the latter few years of the AAM solidarity campaign to end South African apartheid.
2. the scope of a LAAGA group could include procurement boycotts, cultural and sporting boycotts, apartheid/genocide free zones, bilateral links with Palestinian towns and villages, symbolic flying of the Palestinian flag, as well as maximising the scope of pension fund divestment.

Motion 5 Amendment

Proposer: PSC Executive Committee

The AGM notes:

Replace point 2 with "the growing momentum and success of the 'LGPS Divest' campaign driven by grassroots campaigning led by PSC branches and affiliated unions. As a result, at least 30 councils have now backed divestment from companies enabling Israel's crimes against Palestinians, and many of these have also made commitments on procurement – pledging not to enter contracts with companies involved in serious violations of international law"

Add a point 4: "the launch of PSC's 'Councillor Pledge for Palestine', signed by over 900 councillors, asking councillors to commit to 1. Uphold the inalienable rights of the Palestinian people, 2. Support efforts to prevent and punish genocide and Israel's other crimes, 3. Take action to ensure their council is not complicit in Israel's violations of international law."

The AGM resolves:

Point 1.

After "incoming EC to" and before "collaborate", insert: "continue to identify and"

Replace "to establish a "Local Authorities Against Genocide and Apartheid (LAAGA)" with "through the councillor pledge with the aim of establishing a body"

Point 2.

Replace "LAAGA" with "local government"

Motion 6: Form a Trade Union Solidarity Network To Advance The Block Everything Strategy

Proposer: Gavyn Graham

Seconder: Jenny Hardacre

AGM Notes:

- The genocide in Gaza continues, enabled by British weapons, logistics, finance, research, and political support for Israel's occupation and apartheid.
- UN-SC Resolution 2803 advances a renewed colonial project fragmenting Palestinians, disarming resistance, and entrenching Zionist domination.
- Palestinian trade unions affirm that solidarity with Palestine is a core trade-union issue.
- Imperialist war, militarism, austerity, racism, and repression are interconnected processes intensifying exploitation and undermining workers' rights.
- Workers and students supporting Palestine face repression through disciplinary procedures, counter-terror legislation, censorship, immigration controls, and workplace retaliation.
- International strikes and blockades across ports, logistics, universities, public services, and transport demonstrate labour's power to disrupt the genocide economy.
- The King's College London UCU dispute demonstrates how collective use of legal and contractual rights — including health and safety, Equality Act protections, ethical refusal, and grievance procedures — can materially advance Palestine solidarity.
- Ending the genocide requires escalating material action beyond symbolic protest toward sustained industrial disruption.
- The "Block Everything" strategy provides a framework for coordinated workplace action to halt UK complicity.

AGM Believes:

- Ending the genocide requires escalating material action, potentially developing toward a general-strike framework.
- PSC should play a strategic coordinating role alongside trade unions, not substitute for workplace organising.
- Israeli trade unions complicit in apartheid and genocide should not be treated as legitimate international partners.

AGM Resolves that PSC will:

- Establish a PSC Trade Union Solidarity Network to coordinate activists, map strategic workplaces, and share tactics, analysis, and organising strategies.
- Support escalating workplace action to materially disrupt and block the economic, logistical, research, and ideological circuits enabling genocide, including workers-led embargoes and preparation for coordinated strike action with collective protection.
- Defend workers and students facing repression through rapid-response solidarity and publicity.

- Hold trade-union leaderships accountable for delivering material solidarity and challenge separations of “economic” and “political” struggle.
- Strengthen international coordination and political education, including promoting and signing the International Trade Union Statement for Palestine advanced by UCW4Pal, and deepening ties with Palestinian and international labour movements.

Motion 6 Amendment

Proposer: PSC Executive Committee

Replace the title with: Building PSC’s Trade Union Networks

AGM Notes:

Bullet point 8 – replace “escalating material action beyond symbolic protest toward sustained industrial disruption” with “all of us to escalate our actions, including sustained industrial actions in the workplace.”

Replace bullet point 9 with “Welcomes the work of PSC to establish a network of trade unionists, alongside developing targeted trade union organising resources and training, including the workplace organising toolkit.”

AGM Believes:

Bullet point 2 – after “trade unions” add “and activists”

AGM Resolves that PSC will:

Bullet point 1 – Replace “Establish a PSC Trade Union Solidarity Network” with “Continue to build PSC’s networks of trade union activists”

Bullet point 4 – at the start add “Encourage and support members to”

Bullet point 5 – replace with “Strengthen international coordination political education and deepen ties with Palestinian and international labour movements.

Motion 7: Make Media Reform a Strategic Priority in PSC’s Annual Plans

Proposer: Jonathan Coulter

Secunder: Liz Pendleton

The advancement of the Palestinian cause is being severely obstructed by biased news reporting, disinformation, and the systematic omission of key facts, voices and events from mainstream coverage. The use of inflammatory and dehumanising language across major UK news outlets is fuelling a dangerous culture of ignorance, hostility, and violence – directed not only towards pro-Palestinian protesters, but those fleeing war and famine in Palestine and elsewhere.

While PSC and allied organisations communicate effectively with an existing supporter base – one that actively seeks out independent, pro-Palestinian media – this represents only a fraction of the UK public. Most people are deliberately blinded to the scale of ethnic cleansing and genocide being carried out against Palestinians, and of the active role played by the British Government in enabling it. The media abuse their colossal power, and often endorse hate speech in the name of free speech, destroy politicians and degrade democracy. Their unchecked influence over our government has a direct impact on the geopolitical landscape and our ability to end arms trading or war itself.

Fortunately, several established organisations are already working hard to transform the UK media landscape, including the Media Reform Coalition, the Hacked Off campaign, the Press Justice Project, Media Revolution, and the Independent Media Association. These determined groups share core objectives with PSC and represent natural allies - including directly lobbying government for change.

We therefore propose that PSC's Annual Plan for 2026 explicitly incorporates a commitment to advancing media reform as a strategic priority (which is in support of all other activities) and that PSC actively collaborates with media-reform allies to develop a shared strategy for amplifying accurate, justice-focused Palestinian narratives and counter disinformation, e.g a coordinated programme of activities aimed at bringing accurate, humanised and urgently needed Palestinian narratives to wider public attention and challenging the disinformation.

The unprecedented public support for Palestinian justice emerging during the ongoing genocide has given PSC and allied organisations a unique opportunity. By becoming more active in the arena of media accountability and reform, PSC can help create a much-needed shift in the UK's media ecosystem, unlock far broader public understanding, and meaningfully extend the reach and impact of the Palestinian solidarity movement.

Motion 7 Amendment

Proposer: PSC Executive Committee

In title replace "strategic priority" with "focus"

2. Delete paragraph 3 beginning with "Fortunately" ending with "change."
3. In paragraph 4 delete "explicitly".
4. In paragraph 4 replace "as a strategic priority (which is in support of all other activities) and that PSC actively collaborates with media-reform" with "alongside relevant".
5. In paragraph 4 delete "e.g a coordinated programme of activities aimed at bringing accurate, humanised and urgently needed Palestinian narratives to wider public attention and challenging the disinformation".
6. In paragraph 5 replace "becoming more active" with "working with relevant allies whose strategic priorities are".

Motion 8: Free Movement Between Palestine And The UK

Proposer: cwtdh pals

Secunder: Vicky Moller

The future of Palestine is best served by joining up our worlds and not by enforced isolation.

We will support the rights of Palestinians and UK citizens to visit and stay in each others countries for mutual support and solidarity.

The belief that because Israel wants to empty the land of Palestinians, we are doing their work for them by facilitating travel is irrational and oppressive. It is not our job to contribute to Palestine as a prison death camp, It is not for us to decide whether people should stay or leave.

It is our job to support them in their struggle for self determination in all the ways they choose to pursue it.

For this reason PSC welcomes community organisations seeking the right to welcome their Palestinian friends, family and colleagues as part of the movement.

Division and criticism between those burning with the pain suffered by Palestinians only weakens us.

Motion 9: Examples of Anti-Palestinian Racism (APR)

Proposer: Taalib Shamsuddin

Seconder: Suleman Sarwar

Anti-Palestinian Racism (APR) comprises actions, inactions, narratives, or structures that target Palestinians or deny their identity, history, and rights. It includes the targeting or penalisation of supporters.

This PSC AGM resolves to recognise these non-exhaustive examples of APR, consistent with accepted equality and human rights norms.

ERASURE AND DENIAL OF ETHNIC OR INDIGENOUS IDENTITY

1. Using the phrase 'a land without people for a people without a land' to deny Palestinian indigeneity in historic Palestine. (harassment; interference with identity; dehumanisation)
2. Denying the Nakba. (harassment; restriction on expression; denialism)
3. Failing to acknowledge Palestinians as an indigenous people with a collective identity, belonging, and rights in historic Palestine. (direct discrimination; interference with identity)

DEHUMANISATION CREATING A HOSTILE ENVIRONMENT

4. Erasing Palestinians' human rights, equal dignity, and worth. (direct discrimination; dehumanisation; harassment; interference with identity)

RACIAL STEREOTYPING, CRIMINALISATION AND DEFAMATIONS

5. Defaming Palestinians or their allies as inherently antisemitic, a terrorist threat or sympathisers, or opposed to democratic values. (direct discrimination; harassment; restriction on expression)
6. Justifying violence against Palestinians. (dehumanisation; direct discrimination; incitement to violence; failure to protect)

EXCLUSION AND SUPPRESSION OF PALESTINIAN PARTICIPATION

7. Requiring Palestinians or supporters to denounce acts more vociferously or holding them collectively responsible for others' acts. (direct discrimination; harassment; restriction on expression)
8. Excluding Palestinian perspectives, Palestinians, or their allies, or pressuring others to do so. (direct discrimination; harassment; restriction on participation).
9. Politicians and officials failing to engage with Palestinian victims of war crimes or racism while engaging with other racial groups. (indirect discrimination; failure to protect)

UNEQUAL APPLICATION OF LEGAL, POLITICAL AND HUMANITARIAN STANDARDS

10. Denying, delaying, or undermining recognition of Palestine as a state while supporting recognition of Israel. (structural discrimination; impairment of collective rights; restriction on participation)
11. Calling for a safe and secure Israel but not for Palestinian safety and security. (direct discrimination; failure to protect; humanitarian neglect)
12. Denying Palestinian refugees and their descendants the right of return under international law. (direct discrimination; exclusion)

13. Not applying the same international law standards to Palestinians as to other groups. (direct discrimination; restriction on participation)

SYSTEMIC AND INSTITUTIONALISED RACIAL DISCRIMINATION

14. The systems of apartheid imposed on Palestinians, supporting these systems, or denying or minimising their existence against the overwhelming evidence. (apartheid, apartheid denial, structural discrimination)

15. Promoting or excusing extremist settler ideology, including hate or violence towards Palestinians, discriminatory laws, or theft of Palestinian land and resources. (direct discrimination; structural violence and discrimination, dispossession/theft)

16. The Balfour Declaration, by privileging one group on a religious basis, caused lasting harm to indigenous Palestinians by denying their rights and enabling colonisation. (direct discrimination, dispossession)

INTERSECTION WITH ISLAMOPHOBIA

17. Islamophobia and hatred targeting Palestinian Muslims, non-Muslim Palestinians perceived as Muslim, and other Muslims supporting Palestinian rights (direct discrimination; racialisation)

TARGETING SUPPORTERS OF PALESTINIAN RIGHTS BY ASSOCIATION

18. Targeting, vilifying, or penalising individuals for expressing solidarity with Palestinians, including treating support for Palestinian rights as suspect, extremist, or antisemitic by association. (direct discrimination; harassment; restriction on expression; racialisation by association)

Motion 10: PSC to take a leading role in fighting Anti-Palestinian Racism

Proposer: Aasiya Bora

Secunder: Sadat Dar

This meeting calls for PSC to take a leading role in fighting anti-Palestinian racism.

This should take the form of:

1. Adopting the ACLA APR Framework
2. Campaigning for Local Councils to adopt the ACLA APR Framework
3. Maintaining a record of APR incidents
4. Supporting high profile cases and engaging with the EHRC
5. Conducting campaigns to increase awareness of the concept of APR, and the ACLA Framework.

Motion 11: PSC and “TOGETHER – Against the Far Right”

Proposer: Dorset PSC

Secunder: Plymouth PSC

This AGM notes

1. The rise of the far-right in Britain and globally, and the fascist-led “Unite the Kingdom” demonstration on 13 September 2025, marking a dangerous breakthrough for the far-right. We also face a serious far-right electoral threat.
2. The launch of “TOGETHER: Against the Far Right”, an alliance of over 50 campaigns, organisations and civil society groups, including PSC.
3. The recent statement by Stand Up To Racism (SUTR) i) condemning the far-right’s anti-Palestinian racism, support for Israel’s genocide, enforced famine and apartheid, declaring that people who support genocide or apartheid are not welcome on SUTR demonstrations.
4. The fascist street movements, mobilising on a tide of anti-migrant / anti-refugee racism and Islamophobia, imbued with anti-Palestinian racism, now launching attacks on PSC events.
5. Electoral success for the far right in Europe and US has fuelled greater repression against Palestine solidarity movements.

This AGM believes:

1. There is a connection between the far right and fascists here and Ben Gvir, Smotrich and Netanyahu in Israel.
2. Far right and fascist movements pose a serious threat to the Palestine solidarity movement.
3. As an anti-racist, anti-imperialist movement we have common cause with anti-racists, the trade union movement, the Muslim and other communities in mounting mass opposition to the far right.

This AGM resolves that:

1. PSC nationally encourages its local branches to actively mobilise in support of the “TOGETHER Against the Far Right” Unity Demonstration in London on 28 March 2026, for a Palestine contingent.
2. PSC should support counter mobilisations against local and national far right and fascist mobilisations.
3. That where Palestine events are attacked or harassed by the far-right, PSC branches should call for a “defence of the movement” from anti-racist and wider forces.

Motion 11 Amendment

Proposer: PSC Executive Committee

This AGM resolves that:

Replace points 2 and 3 with “While remaining focused on our core aims and objectives, PSC should support local and national counter mobilisations against the far right as appropriate and feasible, including working with anti-racist and wider forces to oppose any attempts to attack or harass Palestine events.”

Motion 12: Preserving the record of events

Proposer: Gillian Bebber

Seconder: Greville Mills

I propose that a start be made in gathering accounts of the myriad aggressions against Palestinians living in the West Bank and establishing an archive for this information that is of legal and historical importance. Many of your

members have contacts in Palestine who recount their lived experience and there is a danger that these voices will be lost unless an organisation such as a PSC with a national membership takes responsibility for safeguarding them.

Motion 13: Intersectionality with interlinked humanitarian crisis

Proposer: Sophus E Magill

Secunder: Sadaf Dar

While I recognise as the PSC our focus is on Palestine, I believe it is also important for the PSC to recognise humanitarian crisis like Yemen and Sudan as interlinked with Palestine - such as the strong ties between UAE, Israel and British complicity - and show intersectional solidarity with the people of Yemen, Sudan and other nations in similar positions, such as raising awareness about the connections between these atrocities and partnering with other solidarity groups tackling these issues.

Motion 13 Amendment

Proposer: PSC Executive Committee

This AGM Notes:

Britain's complicity with Israel enables its oppression of the Palestinian people, and this relationship is also part of a global network of militarised oppression, particularly through Britain's role in the arms trade, with devastating impacts on the people of Yemen, Sudan and beyond.

This AGM Believes:

The Palestinian BDS National Committee (BNC), which the PSC supports, has provided clear direction on the need to establish meaningful political links with other movements aligned with its core principles.

This AGM Resolves to:

1. Follow the lead of the BNC in working together with other movements and struggles aligned with the Palestinian cause whilst maintaining PSC's clear mandate of campaigning on Palestine.
2. Work with like-minded solidarity groups towards shared goals of ending British complicity in colonialism and imperialist wars."
